

Dear Friends

At the start of it all was the Word, the Word being God as with God. He was there in the beginning with God, all things coming into existence through him and nothing existing without him. What has come into being in him is life; life that is light for all people. That light shines in the darkness, the darkness having been unable to extinguish it. He was in the World and the World owed its existence to him, yet the World did not recognise him. He became part of what was his own, and his own people did not accept him. To all, though, ready to receive him and believing in his name, he gave the right to become God's children – children born not of blood or any union of the flesh, nor of any human desire, but of God. The Word became flesh and lived among us, such that we have seen his glory; glory as of a father's only son, full of grace and truth. [John 1:1-5, 10-14]

There is something unusual about the Gospel of John. Unlike Matthew and Luke, John does not start with Mary and Joseph, nor does he refer to Bethlehem, a stable or even a manger. There is no Christmas story at all. Unlike Mark, John does not start with the ministry of Jesus either, though he soon moves on to it. Instead, John takes us to the dawn of time and the events of creation, reminding us of God's sovereign will which has been active since the beginning. Despite everything that was done, everything we continue to do, God's gracious purpose was being worked out from the very start and continues onward.

The coming of Christ was God's natural expression of love, a love constantly at work, revealed in history, declared through the prophets and lived out in flesh and blood. That love will be with us as we go into a different future than some of us might have imagined. We may be selling the sanctuary at Warwick Road but we are starting something new based at the Baginton Road church site – a new name, a new way of being, a new mission. It might feel scary, we might have lots of questions and not many answers, but John's testimony calls us to reflect on all that God has yet to do in the light of everything God has already done. We are promised that we will not be alone in this - God's love walks with us every step of the way.

God bless and have a wonder-ful Christmas as we go into a brand new year.

Have yourself a Greener Christmas

Wrapping presents: Shiny foil wrapping 'paper' and glittery Christmas cards cannot be recycled so will go to landfill. Alternatives include using seasonal scarves, reusable bags or even newspaper for wrapping.



Trees: Despite recent research, it is generally accepted that real trees have less impact on the environment than plastic ones - but throwing away a good plastic tree you already own and replacing it with a real tree defeats the point! An alternative to a tree inside is to decorate a tree outside with treats for the birds.

Food: The typical Christmas meal generates 20kg of CO² emissions, 60% from the turkey. The total carbon footprint of all the UK Christmas dinners is equivalent to 6,000 car trips around the world or 300 return car journeys to the moon. Try to use locally sourced ingredients. Even not overcooking the spouts will help!

NEWS IN BRIEF FROM AROUND THE UK AND BEYOND

The 148 year-old Church of England church of St Michael's in Bournemouth is to be renamed St Mike's in an attempt to bring new life into an old Grade II building and the planting of a new congregation. They will be opening a new coffee bar and hope to offer a drop off café several mornings a week. Comments have been mixed such as "what next ... St Pete's or St Dave's?" or "Why, the Bible has not changed?". There is a nearby St Michael's CofE Primary School.

In 1941 the Church of England had 18,666 churches but a report states that within five years from now that could be below 16,000, with a possible 368 churches at risk. Friends of Friendless Churches, a charity that already looks after 58, say it should not be so fast or easy to close a place of worship; however, the CofE is looking at speeding the process up by reducing consultations from two to one.

Greta Tomlinson died in September aged 94 years. Greta was the first female "strip cartoonist" for The Eagle magazine, joining in February 1950. This comic magazine was thought up by the Reverend Marcus Morris and Chad Varah from the Society of Christian Publicity who wanted a wholesome antidote to the horror and sensationalism of American crime comics. The first issue in April 1950 sold 900,000 copies and continued until 1969 with a revival in 1982 and the last issue in 1994. The lead character was Dan Dare, an interplanetary person of the year 2000.

The latest (October 2021) high-ranking priest in the Church of England to convert to Catholicism is Michael Nazir-Ali who was Bishop of Rochester 1994-2009 and formerly Bishop of Raiwind in Pakistan. This follows the conversion of the former Bishops of Ebbsfleet and Burnley earlier this year.

The Vatican has issued a new version of its 'Click to Pray' app that gives users specific objectives for which they can pray together with the Pope, plus a reminder of their chosen time to pray. A first update since inception in 2016 has now been released, with a seven-language option including Chinese.

On 21 November, Venetians held a service of thanksgiving at the church of Santa Maria della Salute. A pontoon bridge was created across the Grand Canal to allow a pilgrimage to process from St Mark's Square. This domed church was built to mark the end of a plague in 1630, with completion in 1678.



Brenda Morris (aged 78 years) wanted to leave her body to science but had a Star Wars theme funeral instead. The undertakers were dressed in Star Wars Stormtroopers uniforms led by Darth Vader.

Sir Michael Palin is usually associated with the TV satire programme Monty Python's Flying Circus where he played the Boring Prophet, Pontius Pilate, and also played one of the three wise men in the film *The Life of Brian*. Today he is vice-president of the National Churches Trust which crusades to preserve sites. Sir Michael has said: "Churches remain a vital and much-loved part of the UK's heritage and we cannot let them fall into neglect and disuse. More and more churches are adapting to the modern world, providing not just spiritual comforts but a range of valuable services to local people such as food banks and youth clubs".

A study by probate experts published in The Law Society Gazette expresses concern about online wills. It found that consumers are often mistaken as to whether their affairs are 'simple' or 'complex' and that the online will-writing companies themselves 'offer very little liability for something going wrong'. Solicitors are required to have Professional Indemnity Insurance covering claims potentially as high as £2m or £3m (and some can take this as high as £10m per claim), but other professionals offering wills services limit their liability to the cost of the will.

Pope Francis has announced what could be the first reform in the Catholic Church for 60 years - a two-year process to consult every member in the world on such subjects as women's ordination, married priests and same-sex relationships. It will also look at alleviating poverty, climate change, and how the Church is run.

Nearly 1,500 financial institutions spanning 71 countries having more than £28.47 trillion of assets under management are committed to some form of fossil fuel divestment. This includes more than 70 faith institutions such as Methodists, Presbyterian Church of Wales, Catholic Bishop's Conference of Scotland and 15 Catholic dioceses in the UK and Ireland.

As a church, lots of us already support Coventry City Mission who carry on such wonderful work in Wood End. This item is not intended to discourage you from supporting their work but simply to make people aware that if they want to specifically donate toys or children's clothes, GrowKids would be happy to receive them. 



Mission Outreach and Worship Report - December 2021

My goodness where does the time go? We continue to emerge from the various lockdowns and restrictions we have endured and the church buildings are becoming very active once again, reaching out into our community and providing a space for people to gather. It all feels like the heartbeat has returned to our buildings.

I extend my thanks to the many volunteers who have returned to help make West Orchard a thriving community once more and I hope that I provide a useful support for all you do. Here is a sample of some of my recent activities:

I continue to plan and lead Sunday worship at West Orchard and Warwick Road, and to edit and upload these to YouTube. Coffee morning is proving very popular with our community and at least a dozen new people from the local community have joined our bi-weekly Coffee in The Car Park event. I thank all our volunteers who make this such a success. If you would like to join us, please come and share a hot drink and a chat - I am always looking for volunteers.

On Thursdays I often attend Luncheon Club; I also plan, organise and enjoy the bimonthly Saturday Men's Breakfast.

The Tuesday after-school club, Drench Café, when 12 or so young people share fellowship, is a valuable mission – thanks to Marilyn and Sue for their continued dedication. I have also resumed my links with four of our local primary schools.

Evening meetings make up quite a lot of my weekly hours. Sue Davis and I have been trialling the Difference Course with the Tuesday House Group and we are looking to roll out the course to five churches across the south of Coventry next year. This is a Bible Study-type course with a theme of healing and reconciliation between different community groups and is sponsored by the Archbishop of Canterbury.

Planning for the future of West Orchard is an important part of my Mission role. I continue to work closely with both sets of church leaders on the successful merger of West Orchard and Warwick Road. All plans and ideas will of course be subject to approval at church meetings in the future. Watch this exciting space.
