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Dear Friends

The Lord went ahead of them the whole time, a pillar of cloud to guide them by day and a pillar of fire to lighten their way by night, so that they could travel by day or night. Neither the pillar of cloud by day nor the pillar of fire by night moved from its place in front of the people. [Exodus 13:21-22]



Imagine what it must have been like to be one of the people of Israel during the 40 years of wandering in the wilderness. Many, no doubt, must have thought their flight from Egypt would be short, leading swiftly on to an exciting if somewhat uncertain future. Many wanted to go back to things as they were. The reality, however, was that a lifetime's journey lay ahead, living as nomads in search of the Promised Land. Precisely where that was – and when they would get there – seemed hidden even from Moses. Yet, though the final destination was unclear, the route they had to take was not a matter of guesswork, for God was there to guide them. Just as he had led Abraham so now, with a pillar of cloud and fire, he directed their footsteps. They did not travel alone; God was travelling with them.

By the time many of you read this we will have had our final celebratory service honouring the many years we have gathered at Warwick Road Sanctuary and our first service of the new Baginton Road URC and I know that your emotions may be like the people of Israel. Some will be excited about what lies ahead, whilst others will be mourning what is being left behind. It may take some time for us to recognise that we are all fellow pilgrims on a journey into the unknown.

Not many of us are privileged to receive such a clear sign of God's presence as pillars of smoke or fire but the principle is one that applies to each one of us. As we journey into the next stage of our Christian life together, God is always there to share in our pilgrimage – leading, encouraging, equipping, providing. We have no more idea of where our path may take us than Abraham or Moses had, but we can have the assurance that wherever we are asked to travel, God will travel with us.


The Big Church Read

News and Thank You from CCM Giving Tree



Thank you so much for your help with the 2021 Giving Tree project, whether with gifts, money, time or prayer. Without you we could not have given gifts to so many children in the city who otherwise would not have received any. We were able to give presents to a record number of 1,125 children from 475 families. When we distributed them, we worked with churches in Tile Hill, Foleshill and Willenhall, enabling us to reach families in more areas of the city than before.

It didn't go as expected, with Covid regulations making us change our plans and delay decisions all the time. Last year we knew we had to run it ourselves from the start, with no outside help from volunteers. This time we were able to have some people in to help us in the end but on a much more limited basis than usual.

However, there are so many things to be grateful for: we had an additional member of staff working with us; people supplied wrapping paper just when we had run out; additional toy donations arrived just when we were heading out to the shops to buy some; and there were many more instances of God helping us through all of you.

For two years of pandemic, we've not been able to have the usual parties when parents and children come to collect their bags of wrapped presents, do Christmas crafts, have refreshments and see Santa. At least we were able to provide party bags for all the children aged under 11 whose families came to collect their bags from us.



I received a number of messages of thanks after the distribution, both from families and from agencies supporting them. One family sent a card saying "Thank you so much for your continued support".

We are hopeful that Giving Tree 2022 will be easier and more 'normal'. We're already thinking of ways to have more contact with the families referred to us. We also hope that you will want to be involved again later this year. Thank you again for your support and generosity which has made so much difference to so many people.

NEWS IN BRIEF FROM AROUND THE UK AND BEYOND

A miniature gold Bible has been found by a metal detectorist in farmland near York. This solid gold object is 1.5cm long and weighs approximately 5g. Researchers think that it could have belonged to a relative of Richard III (1452-1485) as it was found near Sheriff Hutton Castle, a property that once belonged to the King.

The London Garden Trust have been given the right to appeal against the plans to build a £75m Holocaust memorial in Victoria Tower Gardens, Westminster. They claim that it would damage the area and overshadow a monument to the abolition of slavery. The appeal will be held this year.

Delegates at the Church of England's General Synod in November 2021 decided to wear colour-coding to indicate whether to hug or not. Green was 'no social distance required', Amber meant 'a respectful social distance' and Red was 'please maintain a social distance of one to two metres where possible'.

The Heritage at Risk Register has named 16 sites in Coventry. The Church of St Mark in Swanswell was added to the list needing repairs to its walls and roof plus boundary walls to Stoney Stanton Lane and Bird Street. The Church of St John in Spon Street needs brickwork repairing. Charterhouse on London Road was also mentioned but repairs to its roof have commenced.

The journalist Maureen Cleave has died. She became associated closely with The Beatles, and was known as "Maureen Thingy" by them. In a teen fanzine magazine published during The Beatles' only tour of the USA was the headline "John says Beatles are bigger than Jesus", which resulted in a huge outcry and the public burning of their albums.

Coventry's Hebrew Congregation Synagogue was built in Barras Lane in 1870 (with its entrance in Gloucester Street). This Orthodox Synagogue stopped holding services in 1999 due to a decreasing congregation and moved to the Solihull Shul. For a short while the building was used by the Coventry Reform Jewish community. The building – which contains many original features including seating, ark alcove, binah and mikveh (sunken bath for ritual bathing) – is being restored, along with the Rabbi's house. The main issue is dry rot throughout.

In the USA there is a shortage of headstones, with grieving families waiting for up to 12 months because of global problems in the supply chain. The granite comes mostly from India and China, and also Asia. The USA's supply chain is at least five months. Matters are not helped by the post-war baby boom generation starting to die, plus Covid-19 deaths.

Dorothy Manley, a URC elder, died on 31 November 2021. In the 1948 London Olympics she was the first British woman to win a medal in the 100 yards race. Silver was the colour she won; alas, Britain has never won a gold in this event.

In January 2021 Matt Bird, founder and chief executive of Nayba, a Christian charity, wrote an article discussing whether some Christians might think that the words "faith" and "wealth creation" are incompatible. Now he has launched a seven-week course to help churches, their parishioners and wider community to start businesses. His book, *The Spirit of Enterprise: Helping entrepreneurs transform neighbourhoods*, is being translated into seven languages. Through all the sessions, the course explores Biblical connections based on the idea that wealth can create well-being – for example, in the 19th century there were the Quaker families Rowntree, Cadbury and Fry with their confectionery businesses. Many churches have spare space which budding entrepreneurs can use for their start-ups. Today there is Grace Church, Nottingham, with a cleaning business that already has a £30,000 turnover and Cheriton Baptist Church in Folkestone with paddleboarding classes, while Causeway Coast Vineyard Church in Northern Ireland runs a log fuel business in unused buildings.

A gentleman celebrated his 70th birthday by giving each member of his family a copy of his recently completed autobiography, primarily to ensure that at his funeral his eulogy would be given from this book. When mentioning this to his vicar, the response was "I attended many more funerals than you, you cannot trust anyone, make it a video delivered by you!"



The Great Mosque of Cordoba, Spain, which was built between the 8th and 10th centuries on the site of a former church, has been a Cathedral since 1236 when the site was reconquered by Christian forces. Nowadays it is having problems with tourists. Up to 2 million tourists visit each year, mainly in the summer when temperatures can be 47°C (116.6°F), and the humidity created is damaging several areas including the famed horseshoe-arched mihrab, the prayer niche indicating the direction of Mecca, with its many columns reaching up to a

wooden roof. During the Islamic period in Spain this building was the second largest after the Holy Mosque in Mecca. It is most famous for its forest of columns and double-tiered arches which have been influential on western Islamic art.

At the beginning of December in Oymyakon in Russia's far east, the air temperature is minus 57°C. It is also the start of the outdoor swimming season where the bathers enter the water after being blessed by their Orthodox Christian Priest. This action is seen as one that will wash away their sins. The water temperature is 2°C, coming from warm springs.

Eco news



We have all heard the news about single use plastics and the effect of microplastics on the rivers and sea. Many people feel that it is very hard for us, as individuals, to make a difference.

Here are four suggestions we could all consider using in the kitchen:

- Bicarbonate of soda, distilled white vinegar and lemon juice make great natural alternatives to shop-bought products that come in plastic packaging.
- Try reusable cleaning cloths instead of disposable ones. You can even repurpose an old T-shirt as a cleaning cloth.
- Use a refill station to top up the same plastic bottles with washing up detergent, rather than buying new bottles every time you need more. The closest I can find to us are in Coventry Market or Leamington Spa.
- Look for biodegradable dishwater tablets that are soluble in water.

Coventry Foodbank update

The food and toiletries collected at our church on a weekly basis (the green box is under the table opposite the office door) go to

the distribution centre at St Catherine's, Stoke Aldermoor, as it's quite local to us.

They are open for just two hours every Monday. Despite that short time, in the last nine months they have helped 500 people with food for three days (a standard food parcel) - 50% more than two years ago, when the numbers were already rising.

The rise in energy costs this Spring will inevitably bring more people needing help as they are unable to both heat their homes and feed their families. With that in mind, Foodbank are setting up a new advice service where those coming for food can get help with the longer-term issues which lie behind food hunger, e.g. energy costs, unemployment, disability support and mental health issues.

Volunteering opportunity – at the main food warehouse in Binley, volunteers pick and pack items to make up the food parcels before they are sent out to the distribution points like St Catherine's. Birds

foodbank

Many of us love to watch the birds in our gardens. Here are some tips from the RSPB about feeding the birds:

- Blackbirds mostly feed on the ground and will eat a broad range of foods, from fatty nibbles to mealworms.
- Blue tits and great tits use a feeder, eating seeds as well as suet and peanuts.
- Finches, including chaffinches and greenfinches, use both a feeder and a bird table, and they love sunflower hearts.
- Look for good quality bird food those that don't include 'fillers' such as dried peas and beans that birds rarely eat.
- Put out leftovers such as bread, fruit cake, dried fruit, unsalted pastry, or fruit such as apples and pears. Don't use anything mouldy or salty, and if you have a dog, don't put out dried fruit such as raisins this can be toxic to them.

If you find you do not get enough visitors to your garden (or the smaller birds are chased off by squirrels, magpies and pigeons) view the RSPB live webcams from the Arne Nature Reserve looking over Poole Harbour or their live feeder cam.


We would really hope that some of you would like to join us. No experience is needed and it really is a worthwhile and rewarding couple of hours a week.




