



Dear Friends

But I think it is necessary to send back to you Epaphroditus, my brother, co-worker and fellow soldier, who is also your messenger, whom you sent to take care of my needs. For he longs for all of you and is distressed because you heard he was ill. Indeed he was ill, and almost died. But God had mercy on him, and not on him only but also on me, to spare me sorrow upon sorrow. Therefore I am all the more eager to send him, so that when you see him again you may be glad and I may have less anxiety. So then, welcome him in the Lord with great joy, and honour people like him, because he almost died for the work of Christ. He risked his life to make up for the help you yourselves could not give me. [Philippians 2:25-30]



Very soon it will be the final AGMs of Warwick Road URC and West Orchard URC followed by a church meeting where we will look at filling gaps in those jobs that need to be done in our merged Baginton Road URC. And I know we will get to that point in the proceedings that everyone dreads when I pronounce those terrible words. 'Any volunteers?'. I suspect there will be posts where there are no volunteers. Paradoxically, if I were to ask someone directly, face to face, there is the prospect of a very different response because when we are put on the spot many of us find it virtually impossible to say 'no'. It may be a cliché but it is also true that 'if you want something done, ask a busy person'.

However, what the saying fails to add is that that extra task taken on may just prove to be the straw that breaks the camel's back. So, if you are the sort of person who takes on ever more jobs, responsibilities and demands, even when you are already flagging under the strain, take note. Paul's words afford us a glimpse of Epaphroditus, a man who quite clearly took on too much and nearly paid for it with his life. He learned the hard way that we all have our limitations beyond which it is foolhardy to push ourselves. It may seem the Christian thing to say yes, but if it causes our health to suffer endangering the happiness of those we love and, in the end, preventing us from fulfilling the responsibilities as we would want to; then perhaps it is time to learn to say no. All of us can do something, however small. None of us is called to do everything!

Prayer Walking in our Local Area



In 2020, all the churches in Coventry got together to do a prayer walk for the whole of the city. The idea was that, as a church, the whole of Coventry would be prayed for and blessed by God.

And so, God has placed on my heart the idea of repeating this prayer walk for our local area here in South Coventry. "Every place that the sole of your foot will tread upon I have given to you, just as I promised to Moses" [Joshua 1:3].

The challenge would be that we pray for approximately 300 streets in the Cheylesmore, Stivichall and Earlsdon area. My hope is that we can complete this during the months of August and September when the weather is generally fine and before the dark nights set in.

So, how can we do this?

A list of street names will be placed at the back of church and circulated. I invite everyone to cross off a number of streets for which they wish to pray (probably the one you live on, and those nearest). If everyone prays for three or four streets, the list will soon be completed.

Don't worry if you can't actually physically walk the street, everyone can take part; God knows our hearts and therefore it is just as valid to pray for a street from your chair at home. If you can't get to the back of church, just let me know the streets you are praying for and I will cross those streets off for you.

If you are able to walk the streets you wish to pray for, please keep safe and perhaps go in groups of two or three.

As you set off walking, begin with your eyes on Jesus. Say the name of Jesus; recite the Lord's Prayer for the street; hum a worship song – basically anything that helps declare the Lordship of Jesus over the streets you walk on.

Ask God for His Spirit to fall on the streets you walk on or are praying for. Consider the homes, schools, shops or church buildings you walk past. Pray that the street will be blessed by Jesus. Ask that God may bring healing, peace and hope to the streets of our neighbourhood. I will also make available a generic prayer to help you as you pray.

I'm hoping and praying that you are able to join me on this journey and help us to be a blessing to our neighbourhood.

NEWS IN BRIEF FROM AROUND THE UK


Travelling to London sightseeing? St Paul's Cathedral, following an 86% fall in visitors, will still be charging tourists £18 each to visit but is changing this to an annual pass. The cathedral needs 700,000 visitors a year to meet its annual running cost of £8m.

Congratulations to Brinklow URC who have won a Bronze Eco Church Award for Worship and Teaching, Management of Buildings and Land, Community and Global Engagement, Lifestyle.

The selection and training of candidates for Church of England (C of E) clergy normally takes five years with retirement at 70 years, thus causing problems as congregations are living into their eighties. The Rev Nicky Gumbel, 67, who is stepping down after 17 years as vicar of Holy Trinity, Brompton, London, is encouraging adherents to consider the "Caleb" way of becoming a priest. This scheme (Creating Anointed Leaders to Empower the Body) is geared towards those who are probably churchwardens or similar and have perhaps taken early retirement. It aims to have participants ordained and working within the church they attend within 12 months, especially where their church has no vicar. It is named after Caleb who was still going strong at 85 years.*

The C of E has announced £3.6bn of central funding to assist "poor rural parishes" over the next nine years, after admitting that they have been concentrating on "deprived urban areas". It will also will spend £190m on helping the church meet its target of hitting net-zero carbon emissions from its land and buildings by 2030.

Film-maker, David Rolfe does not believe that the Turin Shroud is a fake and has asked the British Museum to "prove it". His 1978 film *The Silent Witness* was made to unravel the mystery surrounding the Shroud which was alleged to have been the burial garment of Jesus. He has made a new film, *Who Can He Be?*, in which he argues that the samples for testing were likely to have



been taken from a corner that had been repaired over the centuries. In 1988 carbon dating by three laboratories in different countries found that the Shroud was a forgery from the 13th or 14th century. To add to the challenge, he has offered \$1m if they can repeat the exercise and result, as he believes the Shroud is the original.

Librarians in Leeds have found a bible that is nearly as small as a £1 coin, during a survey which saw nearly 3,000 items being catalogued in the recent lockdown period. This bible is complete with Old and New Testaments on gossamer-thin pages, and is chained to a wooden stand and is able to be put in a jacket pocket. The 876-page tome was printed in 1911 and one needs a magnifying glass to read it.

A table to seat 50 people, which is made from one 5,000-year-old black oak tree, has been installed in Ely Cathedral. It is thought that the tree collapsed when the sea level rose and fell into the silt of the forest floor, thus preserving it in an "airless grave" until a farmer discovered it whilst ploughing in 2012. The six-tonne tree was removed and placed in a 15-metre-long dehumidifying kiln which extracted 397 gallons over a nine-month period. Black oak is rare; the density can weigh more than a tonne per metre and is suitable for detailed engraving. From this tree, five full length planks of 14 yards have been cut and joined together.

Martin Seeley, Bishop of St. Edmundsbury and Ipswich, in his maiden speech in the House of Lords on 16 May, said he is growing 478 trees from seed in commemoration of the Jubilee - one tree for each of the churches in his diocese.

On 8 May 2022, Christian and Jewish leaders gathered in Oxford to mark the 800th anniversary of the Synod of Oxford that enacted anti-Semitic laws forcing Jews to wear badges proclaiming their faith, banning friendship betwixt Christians and Jews and preventing Jews from standing for public office. This resulted in the expulsion of 3,000 Jews from England by the end of the 13th Century; Jews were not allowed to return until 1656. The 2022 gathering was held in the presence of many notable clergy of both faiths to try to repent and bring both religions closer. The Chief Rabbi, Ephraim Mirvis did not attend the service by tradition, but said outside afterwards that the service was "deeply appreciated by our Jewish community". The 1222 Synod, which was held at Osney Abbey, is also remembered for making St George's Day a national holiday.

*Caleb (or Kaleb), son of Jesphunneh, is a figure who appears in the Hebrew Bible as a representative of the Tribe of Judah during the Israelites' journey to the Promised Land [Numbers 13:6]. A reference to him is also found in the Quran, although his name is not mentioned.

Tocil Wood & Nature Reserve - Local Hidden Gem!

Tocil Wood is an ancient woodland located within the Warwick University Campus, between Tocil Pools and the new Gibbet Hill Wood. This nature reserve is owned by Coventry City Council and managed by Warwickshire Wildlife Trust. Tocil Pools is a gorgeous place for a walk, a picnic, and to feed the ducks and geese. In spring, the woods are awash with bluebells and wildlife can be spotted all year round. You can find

MORE NEWS IN BRIEF FROM BEYOND THE UK

In Rome, workers have dug up, two metres below road level, an 1,800-year-old memorial stone for a 13 year old girl. Interestingly there is a bunch of grapes on the stonework which was sculpted by using a drill, which also suggests that the child was of a Christian family. This indicates that she was rich and much loved by her parents.

In Venice, there is concern on the island of San Michele about the state and also upkeep of the Protestant Cemetery. Known as the Reparto Evangelica, this island cemetery was started in 1839 following a decree by Napoleon Bonaparte that stopped interments in the cramped city. A recent survey confirmed that poor drainage had led to unstable ground



making headstones becoming loose and coffins emerge. The City Fathers have been asked to fund a £1.3m scheme for new drains. Activists will be contacting descendants of those buried asking for support and also for funding £25,000 to turn a gate house into a visitor centre. Amongst those buried there are Frederic Eden (great-uncle of Anthony), Ezra Pound (American poet), Joseph Brodsky (Russian poet) and British ambassadors, consuls, sailors and priests.



Notre Dame Cathedral, Paris, is still on track to be open by Easter 2024. President Macron recently visited the site to witness the cutting of the first stones for its ceiling.


In India, Dr Rajneesh Singh, a member of the ruling BJP party, has taken out a lawsuit to try to prove that the Taj Mahal, a Muslim monument, contains Hindu relics.

Created two years ago, the Glorify app has now attracted 2.5m followers. The app enables subscribers, for a monthly fee, to listen to bite-sized bible passages, plus create their own digital prayers that they can forward to others. There are also meditation sessions inspired by hymns. The content is strictly non-denominational.





If seafarers seem irrelevant to your daily life, think again: 90 per cent of everything you buy in the shops comes to you by sea. Merchant seafarers quite literally keep our global economy afloat. Yet it is a tough life, far from loved ones. Merchant ships are harsh working environments, never mind the threat of piracy or even shipwreck. To help the seafarers, a worldwide network of port chaplains has sprung up. They offer hospitality and friendship, as well as practical, emotional and spiritual support, providing almost a 'home from home' in hundreds of ports, in more than 50 countries: The Mission to Seafarers (Anglican), The Apostolate of the Sea (Roman Catholic), and The Sailors' Society (inter-denominational).
