

Dear Friends

'For I know the plans I have for you' declares the Lord, 'plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future. Then you will call on me and come and pray to me and I will listen to you. You will seek me and find me when you seek me with all your heart.' [Jeremiah 29:11-13]



I wanted to use this reading for my final message in *Connections* both because it was hugely significant in my own spiritual journey during a time of uncertainty and worry about my future, and also because I think you at Baginton Road need to hear it. And yes, if you were at the Church Meeting on 19th October you will have heard it already. Most messages need to be heard more than once!

I am well aware that some of you are concerned and worried about the future, especially after the past couple of years we have been through. What with Covid and lockdown, with the merger of the two churches West Orchard and Warwick Road, and now my retirement: "Who will do this or that?" "Who will lead us?" "How can we keep going?" and I sometimes think that some people are not aware of what goes on at Baginton Road that has no input from me at all. You are a force to be reckoned with in the community. You have skilled preachers already in place for much of the coming year. You have Pete and now Steve to lead you in the community outreach and work with other churches of our community, but you still worry, I know.

I think it would be helpful for you to remember that God has a plan for all our lives and God has a plan for this church – even if we don't know what it is yet! Hopefully this reminder from Jeremiah is what you need to hear at this time.

Most of us know and cling to verse 11 of Jeremiah 29 - 'For I know the plans I have for you' declares the Lord, 'plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future'. But when we try to understand its historical and literary context, hopefully you will find that it takes on a deeper, more relevant and even more powerful meaning for your life here at Baginton Road. Understanding the context of any passage of Scripture will help to avoid the all too human tendency of reading into it our own desired meaning.

Jeremiah spoke these words to Jews who had been living under the domination of the Egyptian and then the Babylonian Empires before eventually being carried into exile. Previously, Jeremiah had pronounced judgement on the false prophet Hananiah who had told the people that God would break the yoke of Babylon and free the people to return home. It was a message that the people really wanted to hear, a bit like me telling you that you will have a full-time minister all to yourself as soon as I leave Baginton Road. But it was a lie and it would be a lie. Instead, Jeremiah told the people they will live in Babylon for at least 70 years and they

should settle down, build houses, marry and even pray for the peace and prosperity of the place they now found themselves.

Jeremiah was speaking to people in the midst of suffering and hardship, people who were really wanting an immediate answer. But God's response was not to provide immediate help; instead, they were promised that God had a plan to prosper them in the midst of their current situation. We at Baginton Road should take comfort knowing that God has a plan for us too, regardless of how it might seem at the moment.

But we must also look at the verse that follows: 'Then you will call on me and come and pray to me and I will listen to you. You will seek me and find me when you seek me with all your heart'.

So my plea and my prayer for you is that you put the negativity to one side, really look at what is going on in this place and become part of it if you are not already, and most importantly, SEEK God with all your heart, PRAY and ask for guidance, and KNOW that God has a plan, even if it seems that no one else has!

Christmas Gifts for Families in Need - Coventry City Mission's Giving Tree

Sarah White, CCM's Giving Tree Co-ordinator, writes:



Thank you for being part of our Giving Tree project last year. In spite of some Covid restrictions still being in place, we were able to give Christmas presents to 475 families – more than ever before – which meant 1,125 children received gifts. We were so grateful for God's provision through generous people like you.

As a reminder, the Giving Tree project provides gifts for those disadvantaged children in Coventry who wouldn't otherwise receive them. We are keen to support as many families as we can with the added impact of the cost-of-living crisis and are distributing in more areas of the city this year. For us this project is not just about

providing gifts for the children, it is about meeting with families and sharing God's love with them.

Different ways you can help:

- ❖ Bring a gift to church on Gift Sunday. Please note: We aim to give each child a gift worth around £15. You may like to club together with a friend. The toys must be new and unwrapped. CCM cannot give books, clothing, soft toys, CDs, DVDs, electronics or video games.
- ❖ A 'One for All' gift voucher to value of £10 available in PO, many supermarkets and high street shops. (Especially useful for teenagers, given along with a small present.)
- Buy a designated present from the Giving Tree request list on Amazon or a gift card:

- Pray that we can support those most in need across the city despite the challenges. Pray that we will receive enough donations of presents and money required to fund the project. Pray for health of all the staff and volunteers working to make the project happen.

If we investigate this possibility, we would need advice from the Synod solicitor on the legal implications.

PS: Revd Nadene Snyman has written on the URC website about hosting a Ukrainian mother and daughter in her manse, alongside her and husband, Nick. Obviously, this is not the same proposition as renting out a vacant manse.

Appeal - "Open the Book"

Open the Book (OtB) is a national scheme under the auspices of the Bible Society which offers primary school children an opportunity to hear and be involved in key Bible stories told and

acted out by a team of Christians from local churches during school assemblies. Each presentation takes around 15–20 minutes. It is a three-year rolling programme based on Christian values for schools. It has been operating in Coventry schools, mainly in the South Coventry area, for over 20 years.

Mary Goodwin and I are involved as storytellers with OtB at Earlsdon Primary School together with two members of Hearsall Baptist Church and one member of St Barbara's Church. The children often get involved in the stories as "extras" and "noise makers" (wind, rain, etc), and they love dressing up! For many of them this is the only experience they have of the Bible.

Over the years that OtB has been in operation in Coventry, a great number of props and costumes have been produced to better illustrate the stories. All of these have been lovingly and expertly made and many are very large, e.g. the tree for the Garden of Eden, Jonah's whale, Goliath, etc. Boats also feature regularly.

Up until now these props and costumes have been stored in a garage which they fill. Unfortunately, this garage is needed by the church where they are stored at present, hence the reason for this appeal. We need an empty garage or similar size storage area where these items can be stored for weekly access. If you have such a space or know of anyone who does and would be willing to allow the storage of these items, we would be delighted, as would all the children who benefit from having the word of the Lord brought to them each week in such an interactive way.

NEWS IN BRIEF FROM AROUND THE UK AND BEYOND

Bardsey Island, situated on the north coast of Wales, has been connected to the internet by Gwynedd Council and Menter Mon, a Welsh technology company. However, only residents and businesses can log on. The technology also allows the monitoring of sensors for electricity generated by solar panels and the water stored in tanks. Bardsey Island is also known as "the island of 20,000 saints" as St Cadfan is believed to have founded a monastic college there in the 6th Century.

The Lindisfarne Gospels are normally housed in the British Library in London along with the Magna Carta, Shakespeare's First Folio and Handel's Messiah. Now they are on display until 3 December 2022 at Newcastle's Laing Art Gallery alongside other manuscripts also loaned from the British Library including the St Cuthbert Gospel, the oldest intact European book. It is expected this will rekindle the argument that, as the Lindisfarne Gospels are of symbolic significance to the



North East of England, they should remain there. Are the Gospels to be compared to the Benin Bronzes as looted items?

The Trussell Trust has reported that in the year to March 2022, its food banks distributed more than 2.1m emergency food parcels, an increase of 14 per cent against the period 2019-2020. In this last year, data shows 2.4m food bank referrals compared with 1.1m in the 2014-2015 period.

Research by the Joseph Rowntree Foundation shows that 22 per cent of the UK population - 14.5m people - now live in poverty, of which 8.1m are working-age adults, 4.3m are children and 2.1m are pensioners. The overall figure has been at 20 per cent or above since 1994-95.

Christian Concern, an evangelical group, has issued a claim against Fitzwilliam College, Cambridge, after its regular seminar at the university was banned in a row regarding biblical teachings on marriage. The group is suing for religious discrimination under the Equality Act 2010 on the grounds that officials deprived the organisation of a service.



Forgo Advent and Christmas lights this year in Germany, says Environment Action Germany, probably the largest Green Party. "Orgies of lighting" are irresponsible in an energy crisis, they say, and suggest that each town limits itself to a single communal Christmas tree. In Berlin, the city council is not subsidising light displays on the busiest streets and, along with other main cities, plans to switch off lights earlier in the evening or even cancel outdoor ice rinks. Last year it was estimated that the German population decorated their houses with 19.5bn lightbulbs, or 235 per person. Each

December these displays in German homes burn about 600m kWh, enough to keep a city larger than Bonn (population 300,000+) going for a year!

Outreach Update from Steve Elton

October has been a very busy and productive month. We have made some brilliant headway with a number of projects and initiatives and it has been wonderful to have so many different people from the Baginton Road community involved.

- Kintsugi Hope Wellbeing Group: We are now well and truly underway with the first Kintsugi Hope Wellbeing Group and we have had some excellent times together so far, with brilliant discussions around topics such as depression, anxiety, anger and shame. It has been so refreshing to have a space where people are able to talk about their own experience of these emotions as well as support one another with tools, strategies and sometimes just a listening ear. We have a couple of sessions left in November, and will then be beginning to explore how we can offer the course to people in different parts of the church and wider community.
- Agenda-less Worship Evenings: We have had two wonderful Worship
 Evenings at Baginton Road since the launch in September. These have been
 special times of giving our time, attention and worship to Jesus, and there has
 been a real sense of God's presence, inspiration and purpose when we have
 gathered. The next one is on Wednesday 16 November at 8pm.
- A Christmas Worship Project: October was a BIG month for the production of the Christmas Worship Project 'The Invitation'. We were able to film 48 people in multiple locations across the city, reading lines from the spoken word element of the project; we were also able to record the worship element of the project in the Baginton Road Large Hall. It was great to have so many people from Baginton Road involved, both being filmed for the spoken word aspect and also involved in the worship team for the song aspect. It has been a huge effort from all involved, so thank you everyone! The video and audio are being edited now and will be uploaded to the Baginton Road YouTube page ready for release at the end of November. There will also be a link to the video on the 2022 Christmas cards.
- Carols at the Christmas Bazaar: We are looking forward to having Christmas carols at this year's Christmas Bazaar, sung by people from Hope Springs Church and Baginton Road, who will also be performing a version of the Christmas Worship Project Song. Everyone who comes will be given a Christmas Card with the link to the song in it.
- A Christmas Quiz: This has been planned for Saturday 17 December in the Baginton Road Large Hall, in collaboration with Baginton Road, Hope Springs and Quinton Park church communities. There are posters and leaflets available for everyone to use to invite friends, family, neighbours, colleagues, etc. The evening will include a quiz, some live music, food and an airing of 'The Invitation' to add a sprinkle of what Christmas is all about.

Special Cause for November and December - Essential Household Items and Toiletries

During November and December, the money donated to the Special Cause will be used to purchase toiletries, cleaning products and other essential household items such as toilet rolls for distribution through the Coventry City Mission Foodbank. Each week the CCM foodbank distributes 20 - 30 food parcels from their base in Deedmore Road. This food comes from the central foodbank in Coventry and is received by the clients with grateful thanks and often a tearful eye.

However, alongside the need for food there is often a request for toiletries, cleaning items, washing powder, toilet rolls etc. These items are not part of the central distribution whose main focus is, as the name suggests, simply food. Personal hygiene and cleaning items are a huge expense for many families and are just as essential as food. Any money donated during the next two months will be used to buy these items which can then be included with the food parcels.

The Film Club aims to bring together people who like to share and discuss films, their themes and the ideas they raise.






