

Dear Friends

The Church is to be a place of fellowship where Christians can be devoted to one another and honour one another [Romans 12:10]), instruct one another [Romans 15:14], be kind and compassionate to one another [Ephesians 4:32], encourage one another [1Thessalonians 5:11] and, most importantly, to love one another [John 3:11].



Why do you go to church? Why do I go to church? After all, nowadays in Britain at least it isn't the most popular thing to do. We live in a country where many people have no faith in God and where there is more interest in other events than in going to church or other places of worship. However, for those who do go to a church there can be many reasons – habit, meeting friends, making new friends, seeking greater meaning in life or wanting to learn about spiritual matters. Perhaps some may wonder why so many other people in the world follow the teachings of someone who lived 2,000 years ago and who they believe still lives today.

It is possibly a harder question to answer if you have been born and brought up within a Christian church-going family; in that case going to church can be more like "second nature" – something you have always done, until perhaps in your mid- to late teens it becomes time to decide for yourself whether or not to stay – and then the issue is about whether the church provides something which you feel you need at that stage of life. For many, the answer then is negative. And again, for many that remains the case.

That is similar to my journey in church-going: leaving ... but then, in my case, deciding to return. I was baptised and confirmed within the Church of England and attended Sunday School at Coventry Cathedral, but then in my late teens did not attend any more on a regular basis. About ten years later, my then fiancée Diane and I discussed where we wanted to be married and agreed that we wanted it to take place in a church. At that stage the CofE did not marry divorcees. We decided to visit Warwick Road Church and see what it was like, having been invited by a friend Jenny Quinn who was a member. And that was it, as they say. It was a truly life-changing moment for us. We experienced a loving, really vibrant Christian fellowship, a liberal church which avowed a clear faith but accepted doubts and a diversity of views – among lovely warm friendly people. And Revd Roger Hall quickly corralled us into the life of the church.

So, that is why we chose to go to church again. It was also a great place for our two daughters, Kate and Helena, to experience a religious dimension to their lives during their upbringing.

Faith and doubt, belief and uncertainty, hope and despair – these are all feelings which I imagine we all share at one time or another, especially in a world which is full of strife and turmoil, as well as beauty and variety. These feelings are not mutually exclusive of course, but they are manifest privately in our innermost lows and highs. Church can provide an opportunity to confront feelings of doubt and uncertainty among others who are also seeking greater meaning. Church is a place where we can provide opportunities for people of faith and of little faith, or for those simply seeking answers to spiritual questions, to find answers in an atmosphere of mutual support. Searching for greater meaning in our lives is so important, and to be able to do so in a place which is non-judgemental and supportive, and with folk also seeking such meaning, is a treasure which we can offer through so many ways in the activities we support in our church. Whatever stage in your journey of faith, it is always good to be able to reflect and learn from others. In an increasingly individualistic society, we sometimes believe we can find the answers by ourselves, but it is good to receive the perspectives of others in that process. Mutual support and learning don't replace that personal search, but they certainly can help a great deal.

So, whether it's to meet others, chat, share, explore, sing, praise, pray, support, weep, listen, explain, welcome, study, spread the word, worship, contribute, learn, develop or whatever else, church is a good place to be. If we can provide opportunities for people to develop a greater spiritual awareness in a welcoming and supportive way, then the church is doing its job.



NEWS IN BRIEF FROM AROUND THE UK AND BEYOND

Solar cell energy increased by 25% from 2022 to 2023 and now accounts for 5.4% of global energy generated, thus using no or very little fossil fuel to generate electricity. In the first five months of 2025 saw a 42% increase over last year and for some, increased earnings when selling on.

Is the Elizabethan historian William Camden in his 1586 tome, *Britannia*, still correct regarding our weather: "This Isle is blest with a good and temperate Air. The summer by reason of the continual and gentle winds so abating the heat... the summer not scorching nor the winter proves obnoxious to the inhabitants"?

Wink Martindale has died aged 91. He was an American TV show host but in 1963 had a UK No.5 hit with *Deck of Cards*. Based on an old English folk song, it told the story of a soldier accused of playing cards in church. His defence explained what each card represented ... an ace was one God. He updated the story by finishing: "I know, I was that soldier".



Age UK has promoted in the Houses of Parliament the importance of fitness in old age with a challenge to MPs to stand on one leg with their eyes closed. An early participant was Kim Leadbeater with 1m 18s but near the closing of the event came John Slinger, MP for Rugby, who managed 2m 53s!

When the new Pope, Leo XIV, first appeared in Rome he wore a cross with a removable cover that contained the bones of saints which was given to him by his religious order, the Augustinians, in 2023 when he became a Cardinal. There were tiny bones, pieces of three key Augustinians saints: St Augustine, whose writings inspired the Order's foundation; his mother St Monica; and St Thomas of Villanova, a 16th century Spanish Augustinian Italian bishop. The cross also contained the bone relics of two other important Augustinians: Anselmo Polanco, a beatified Spanish bishop who was executed in 1939 during the Spanish Civil War, and Giuseppe Bartolomeo Menocchio, an 18th century Italian bishop.

When interviewed for a newspaper article regarding the use of cash, a sheep farmer said "Agriculture has always used cash. We tend to carry it, as you never know when you might see a good bit of second-hand kit or a nice cow in someone else's yard".

Britain's two largest liberal Jewish denominations have voted for a merger. The Reform Judaism and Liberal Judaism are to become a new non-orthodox denomination called Progressive Judaism which would represent almost 400,000 British Jews, about one third of those affiliated to synagogues. They also want to attract Jews who do not regularly attend synagogues, especially Gen Z, by having female rabbis, conducting same sex weddings, allowing men and women to sit

together during services and deeming people to be Jewish not only through the maternal line but also through their fathers.

The Charterhouse Carthusian Monastery on our London Road has had two statues returned, St Lawrence and St Denis, but with a modern twist. Both statues were in the medieval gardens up to the Dissolution and were later discovered in the grounds by John Whittingham (a



tenant) in the 18th Century. His daughter gifted them to what is now St Osburga's church. In 1944 they were re-discovered and restored. In 2025 they were copied by the 3D process and now the copies are in the Monastery, which is maintained by the National Trust.

A few weeks ago, I received a most unexpected invitation to Westminster Abbey for a Service of Thanksgiving and Reflection to mark the 80th Anniversary of Christian Aid.

The service, which was led by the Sub-Dean of Westminster, the very Reverend David Stanton and sung by the Choir of Westminster Abbey, reflected the work of Christian Aid over the last 80 years and its profound impact.

These last two words remained in my mind as our Treasurer Margaret and I opened your envelopes and counted your donations: £533 (including Gift Aid). There was our 'impact', our response to Save the Children who, with our support, will build a better future, no matter what is going on around them.

They face brutal wars, the devastating effect of climate change as well as the disadvantages of growing up in poverty. But what shines through is their positivity, their energy and their determination to make things better. The children and their families we support, are the best reasons for hope for a better future.

Becoming a Blood Donor

When you are giving blood, you're giving to everyone – including, potentially, yourself.

Have you noticed that we, as a Church, give blood by inviting the NHS Blood & Transplant Unit to park their large vans in our car-park and give them (the team) shelter in our hall?

Artificial blood could be used for transfusions by 2030 if trials in Japan are successful, thus taking shelf life from 35 days to two years.

However, only 2% of our population keep the nation's stocks afloat. Critical is the need for more donors, especially those having Type O Negative blood which is needed for emergencies. Two-thirds of the blood collected is used by people who rely on blood transfusions, including those with cancer or blood conditions.

Tasting Wisdom – A daily companion for meditation

By Laurence Freeman, Canterbury Press. £14.99

Every day for more than a decade, members of the World Community for Christian Meditation worldwide receive a brief reflection, Daily Wisdom, from Laurence Freeman, a Benedictine monk and leader of the community.

In just a few sentences, each day readers can orientate themselves to a more reflective and less reactive approach to the challenges of the coming day and living wisely and well in a restless, noisy world.

This collection of daily meditations will last the whole year, and offers wisdom to begin, end or punctuate the day.

All Shall Be Well: Visions of Salvation with Julian of Norwich By Emmy Pennington, BRF, £12.99

How can all be well in the world in which we live? What does 'All shall be well' mean when all is *not* well? Through revelations 10 to 16 of her *Revelations of Divine Love*, Julian of Norwich returns time and again to the idea that 'all is well'.

In her latest book Emma Pennington examines this popular mantra and explores what Julian really means by it, bringing depth and relevance to these words for the reader who lives in an age of pandemic, war and climate crisis which closely echoes Julian's own.

Through deep engagement with Julian's visions, we are encouraged to reflect in prayer and devotion on our own personal relationship with God.





If you ever struggle with doubt, take heart: so did one of the apostles, whose Feast Day is this month. St Thomas just could NOT believe that the Jesus he had seen crucified and dead on the cross could ever come back to life. But Thomas was an honest sceptic, because he really wanted to know the truth. Jesus could help such a man. And so He appeared to him and the other disciples. Instead of scolding him, Jesus simply showed him the wounds. Thomas's response was immediate: "My Lord and my God" (John 20.26ff). Ancient legends tell how Thomas went on to India as a missionary. There are rumours that Thomas even built a palace for a king's daughter in India, and thus he is the patron saint of architects. It is believed that he was martyred by a spear on 3rd July, 72AD in Mylapore, near Madras. 46 ancient churches in England are dedicated to him.




